

Colored leather quickly shows signs of wear and tear, for example at the location of the spur straps. This is normal wear and tear and is not covered by the warranty.

## After your online purchase:

Try the size of the boots. If they are a little tight, wear a pantyhose instead of socks for the first few days. If they are too big or too small, send them back quickly, you will receive another size.

## Maintenance of leather western boots:



Always treat your boots with a product such as Ouraline before use. Preferably do this at least 1 day in advance so that the maintenance product can be properly absorbed.

Wipe your boots with a slightly damp, clean cloth each time after use to remove mud and other dirt. Be sure to clean the edge of the sole with a brush, as dirt can soak in quickly and damage the leather/stitching.

If your boots are wet, let them dry at room temperature and if necessary, stuff them with absorbent paper, such as newspaper, to dry the inside. Always let your boots dry at room temperature, do not dry them next to a stove or other heat source, this will dry out the leather.

Treat your boots regularly with a colorless leather conditioner in cream form. We sell Ouraline for this purpose. Rub the conditioner in with a soft cloth. Good rubbing has a better result than thick rubbing. Let it soak in. For extra shine you can rub your boots with a nylon pantyhose.

To provide the leather of your boots with a water repellent layer, you can treat them with a water-repellent spray. This contains water-repellent components that can extend the life of the leather. We sell SV Exclusive Waterproof spray.

Do not use saddle soap for your boots, as this can cause a dull color and cause the stitching to come loose (saddles and headstalls have different and thicker stitching than boots and shoes).

Use boot tensioners to maintain the shape of the boots.
